



years. We called on him to help with difficult notifications as well as incidents where staff needed his support. We will miss Art greatly and also wish him the best in his future travels and adventures!



# Investigations Unit

The Investigations unit is staffed by a Detective Sergeant and two general detectives. In addition, the Investigations Unit has a full-time narcotics detective assigned to the DEA task force and a full-time detective assigned to the P.A.T.R.O.L. Auto Theft Task Force. The Investigation Unit were assigned 235 cases in 2014, most of which were felony crimes, of those, 219 cases were cleared. The detectives prepared and executed more than 50 search and seizure warrants related to those investigations.

The Investigations Unit investigated many serious felony crimes that consisted of sexual crimes, crimes against children, fraud and felony assault/domestic violence. Some of the highlighted cases from late 2014 are as follows:

Detectives investigated several sex related crimes that resulted in charges being filed against the perpetrators. One of the incidents was discovered during an unrelated investigation and involved a juvenile. The perpetrator was arrested and plead guilty to multiple charges.

Detectives investigated an adult missing person case, which later resulted in the discovery of the mans body in a remote area of Lewis County.

Detectives conducted an Identity Theft investigation that turned into a multi-jurisdictional investigation which ultimately resulted in charges against numerous suspects with a total loss of more than \$60,000. Detectives conducted another fraud investigation which resulted in several arrests and total loss of more than \$30,000.

Detectives investigated multiple other cases which lead to felony convictions resulting in prison sentences and/or confinement in the Pierce County Jail.

Detectives assisted with several investigations as part of the Pierce County Metro Crime Response Unit including; A child homicide in Dupont, a homicide in Orting and several officer involved shootings.

Detectives participated in several specialized training classes including: Washington State

Homicide Investigators Association annual conference, and mechanical breaching.

# Auto Theft Task Force

The PATROL Auto Theft Task Force had one of their most successful years ever. The following is the highlight case of 2014: Port Logistics Group in Sumner is a secured, fenced area used by trucking companies to store fully stocked semi trailers for transportation at a later date. The rear fence was breached and the security camera wires were cut. Suspects had to climb a 30' pole to access the wire. 5 Semi Trailers carrying merchandise from Best Buy & Ross were stolen. Each trailer was marked with spray painted orange X or XO. The sixth semi trailer crashed in the shipping yard when attempting to leave and blocked the exit so three other trailers with the same markings could not leave. All semi tractors and trailers were recovered within days of the theft. Here is the summary of what was recovered due to diligent investigative work. Recovered items included: TV's, Computers, Refrigerators, & Sound bars. There is approximately \$401,451.00 outstanding merchandise not recovered. This case is the work of a Mexican cartel

## Tahoma Narcotics Task Force (TNET)

2014 saw an end of an era in the DEA Taskforce. After seven years of service to the task force, TFO Todd Morrow was optioned back to Bonney Lake Police. Officer Morrow now currently serves as a grave yard patrol officer. The position was opened up to the entire department and after an interview process another Officer from Bonney Lake was selected as the new TFO. Our new TFO began at the task force in November of 2014. Here are the stats for the 2014: A little more than 2 million dollars in currency and property was seized, more than 25 pounds of Heroin, 1657 pounds of marijuana, 5.4 pounds of cocaine, 1078 Schedule II pills, 147 pounds of methamphetamine, and 1132 doses of Ecstasy were seized in 2014. The task force arrested 89 people in conjunction with the illegal sale or distribution of narcotics.



## Special Weapons And Tactics (SWAT)

The Metro SWAT team is a part-time, multi-agency tactical team which consists of officers from the Bonney Lake, DuPont, Fife, Lakewood, Milton, Orting, Puyallup, Steilacoom, and Sumner Police Departments. The SWAT team is responsible for responding to high-risk incidents in the participating cities. In 2014, the Bonney Lake Police Department had two officers who were assigned to the Metro SWAT as an additional collateral duty.



SWAT in Training

The Metro SWAT team successfully completed 31 missions in 2014, which was an increase from 19 missions in 2013. In 2014, the Metro SWAT team was utilized for apprehending barricaded felony suspects, serving felony arrest warrants, search warrants for stolen firearms, and high risk search warrants. In addition to responding to high-risk situations, members of Metro SWAT provide training to local police agencies in the areas of firearms, patrol tactics, active-shooter response, high risk entries, and defensive tactics. Metro SWAT members also assisted with providing instruction to several area fire departments

# Traffic Unit

We had a successful traffic enforcement year as we again experienced **zero** traffic related deaths and zero serious injury collisions in 2014. Prior to the start of 2014 the traffic unit identified the following enforcement priorities:

**Traffic Unit Priorities & Goals:**

**Zero** Traffic Related Deaths in 2014, Collision Investigation, DUI Enforcement, School Zone Enforcement Speed Enforcement, Traffic Emphasis Patrols, Commercial Vehicle Enforcement and Parking Enforcement.

The traffic unit issued a total of 3,255 infractions/citations in 2014. We focused heavily on school zone and DUI enforcement this past year. Officers issued 373 infractions/citations in school zones and processed 56 impaired drivers. As an entire department, Bonney Lake Officers issued 6277 infractions/citations. In addition to traffic enforcement, the traffic unit was involved in education events during the Bonney Lake Citizens Academy and assisted with traffic control for numerous community events during the year. Traffic units assisted with the 5K Summer School District Fun Run, Bonney Lake Days, Labor of Love Triathlon, Halloween event in Sky Island and the 5K Tour-de-Lights Fun Run. The traffic unit investigated 250 reportable collisions in 2014. This was down from 257 collisions in 2013. This year we announced special traffic emphasis patrols each month designed to address specific traffic safety concerns. In 2014 we conducted the

MCRT participated in quarterly training in January, April and July. Most of the quarterly MCRT training in 2014 involved evidence identification and forensic mapping using the Total Station equipment. All of the MCRT collision investigators became familiar with the Total Station Equipment during these training classes and used the equipment to map a collision scene. MCRT Officers attended Technical Collision Investigation class in Lakewood and



The Bonney Lake Police Department continued its participation in the Tacoma/Pierce County DUI Task Force. The task force is designed for law enforcement agencies in Pierce County to work as a cooperative group to concentrate DUI and traffic enforcement efforts throughout various locations in Pierce County. Each month, officers from these different agencies work DUI or speed emphasis in the local area of the host agency. The DUI Task Force was developed in 1983 when citizens were appointed by

Tacoma and Pierce County elected officials to design and implement an education, public information, and enforcement program. Since that time, the program's scope and community involvement has continued to expand and has evolved into today's DUI Task Force.

Bonney Lake Traffic & Patrol Officers worked DUI emphasis patrols in Tacoma, University Place, Puyallup, Fife, Bonney Lake/Sumner/Buckley and areas of unincorporated Pierce County. Bonney Lake hosted the DUI Emphasis Patrol on January 25<sup>th</sup>, 2014. This emphasis patrol was in dedication to Gary Slick who was killed as a result of an impaired driving collision that occurred in Bonney Lake. A victim dedication sign was erected on 214<sup>th</sup> AVE E at the site of fatal collision in Gary Slick's memory. During this emphasis patrol, 177 traffic stops were made, 62 NOI's and 17 citations were is-

The Bonney Lake Police Department continued its participation in the Washington State Patrol's Target Zero Team. Target Zero is the state's strategic highway safety plan, and calls for reducing highway deaths to zero by the year 2030. The entire plan can be found at [www.targetzero.com](http://www.targetzero.com). Enforcement is one of four equal strategies of Target Zero, along with engineering, education and emergency medical service. Grants from the Washington State Traffic Safety Commission reimburse law enforcement agencies' salaries for their involvement in these programs. Sergeant Robert Hoag continued to represent Bonney Lake as a member of the Target Zero Team. Sergeant Hoag arrested 17 impaired drivers during Target Zero Emphasis Patrols in 2014. Sergeant Hoag made DUI arrests in Tacoma, Puyallup, Parkland, Bonney Lake and Sumner in 2014. Officer Alfano received the annual DUI Victim's Award

## Property Room

The property room began the year with the annual appropriated property audit. There are 75 items appropriated to various officers or work spaces within the department. Four (4) items were destroyed and/or depleted through department training with all other items accounted for.

We received and processed into our evidence room approximately 975 items for 2014. We processed 67 release requests for return of property to the applicable owners/victims.

The property room has continued to strive to maintain effective property room management by the disposing of evidence that is no longer required to be retained in the evidence room.

We had a total of 211 items of illegal drugs, 847 items of property and 40 firearms that were destroyed. There was a total of 35 items that went to Propertyroom.com for auction that generated an approximated total of \$881.18 in additional revenue for the department.

The Tacoma – Pierce County medicine disposal box located in the front lobby of the Police Department has been a successful drop-off location for citizens to safely dispose of both prescription and over-the-counter medications that have expired or no longer wish to have in their homes. 

20th Annual Citizens Academy—2014

Community Service Officers of the Bonney Lake Police Department continued to provide excellent support working with our Patrol Officers, Sergeants, and Command Staff in 2014. Community Service Officers (CSO's) also worked to promote Crime Prevention and Community Oriented Policing in both the residential and business community.

Although CSO's have a wide range of duties and responsibilities there are several which can be considered primary. They included: prisoner transports, BLMC court security, property room management, electronic monitoring, and crime analysis.

CSO Miller is also assigned to P.A.T.R.O.L. the Regional Auto Theft Task Force. In September CSO Flaherty retired after many years of service for the Bonney Lake Police Department. In October, Reserve Officer Nate Alvord filled the vacant CSO spot.

2014 was a busy year for court cases at the Bonney Lake Municipal Court. An average of 767 criminal cases were heard monthly for a grand total of 9,208. CSO's also provide court security during Traffic Court, which takes place 1-2 times per month. BLMC heard a grand total of 2,148 traffic cases this year.




CSO's continue to transport inmates to and from jail. Felony prisoners are transported primarily to Pierce County Jail while gross misdemeanor and misdemeanor prisoners are transported to Enumclaw, Puyallup and Fife Jails depending upon available jail space. CSO's transported a grand total of 369 prisoners this year.

## Crime Prevention and Community Events Cont.



CSO Alvord oversees and supervises the electronic monitoring program for the BLPD for those offenders that have been sentenced to home monitoring by BLMC. Electronic Monitoring reduces jail cost and allows offenders to work while serving their sentences. Up until late 2014, Bonney Lake PD had only supervised home monitoring and offenders would use an outside company for alcohol monitoring. CSO Alvord introduced TAD monitoring (Transdermal Alcohol Detection) to Bonney Lake. The Electronic Monitoring program provided 98 days of monitoring for a savings of \$8,608.00 in jail costs in 2014.

CSO's also provide court ordered Day Court for some offenders who have been convicted of Bonney Lake Municipal Court charges. Day Court allows prisoners a chance to serve their time in the courtroom instead of being jailed. CSO's supervised a total of 36 Day Court prisoners in 2014 saving the city more than \$2500 in jail costs.



CSO's are also in charge of radar trailer deployment and statistics. Flaherty and Alvord deployed the radar trailer roughly 17 times this year throughout the city, providing valuable information. Throughout 2014, CSO's participated in a variety of community and school events. Bonney Lake Days, National Night Out, Citizen's Academy, Open House, Scout Night, Shop with a Cop to name a few.



CSO's also participated this year with Tip a Cop. Members of the Bonney Lake Police Department transformed into waiters and waitresses for the day serving food and drinks at Red Robin, raising over \$2500 for Special Olympics. CSO Alvord also participated in Bonney Lake's first Park Smart event. Officers and volunteers visited numerous store parking lots in the city, handing out flyers and candy canes to shoppers educating citizens on ways to prevent vehicle burglaries. This event was staged twice this

## MARINE PATROL UNIT

The Bonney Lake Marine Service Unity (MSU) continued its dedication to the lake community and guests by making safety and education its priority. With our goals in mind, the Marine Unit continued to be busy with water safety education, boater education courses, patrolling Lake Tapps, school education and joining forces with the U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary and East Pierce Fire & Rescue all in an effort to keep our community safe.

For the first time ever, the Bonney Lake Police Department joined forces with the U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary; we put on four boater education courses and served nearly 100 students. This joint effort was a huge success; saving on funding and recourses all while providing the community the State required boating course. The program is an eight hour course which costs \$25.00 a person with the graduate receiving their boater education card. This program will continue into 2015.

At the start of the 2014 boating season, officers examined the City of Bonney Lakes buoys and found two red solar buoy warning light batteries had died; the batteries were replaced. Officers checked all the buoys and some had to receive some repairs. We purchased and placed new water buoys around Allan Yorke Park to increase safety and visibility as well as re-decating 7 existing buoys with reflective tape. Two buoys were refurbished and replaced back on the lake. We also marked all of the buoys with a City of Bonney Lake marking for future identification.

Due to an exceptional summer, Officers worked a record 202.5 hours on the water and issued a record 321 written inspections with 141 inspections passing and 180 failing. Officers issued 23 citations, assisted 9 citizens along with 6 vessels that had broken down in the water. We had one new Marine Service Officer complete the boater education course and in April completed the Basic Law Enforcement Marine training.



This was the second year in a row since 2001 that Lake Tapps did not have any fatalities. The Bonney Lake Marine Unit, City of Bonney Lake and its constituents remain steadfast in the common goal of continuing this trend into 2015. Thanks in part to the Bonney Lake Police Department's Marine Units hard work along with the large collaborative educational effort, stemming from Mayor Johnson, Chief Powers, Assistant Chief Keller, Assistant Chief Alfano, East Pierce Fire Chief Jerry Thorson, and Dina Sutherland, the Bonney Lake community and its surrounding communities we are proud to

## Marine Patrol Continued



The MSU presented a “Swimsafe” program and a water temperature buoy project to the State Boating Advisory Council. The Advisory Council agreed to contribute between \$3,000 toward the buoy project. A “GoFundMe” webpage will be launched soon to hopefully raise the remaining funds needed to complete the buoy project. The Lake Tapps Incident Locator Sign project has been launched. Several signs have been sold via [www.eastpiercefirer.org](http://www.eastpiercefirer.org) BLPD / EPFR facilitated a “Swimsafe” media segment with King 5 that featured the water temperature

buoy and Lake Tapps Incident Locator projects. East Pierce Fire continues to stock the life jacket loaner kiosks at Allan Yorke Park. The Marine Unit partnered with East Pierce Fire & Rescue and Sumner Bonney Lake Aquatics to host April Pools Day. The Marine Unit participate in Operation Dry Water, including live television media coverage (King 5 and NW Cable News) as well as having a reporter from the Bonney Lake Courier Herald ride-along with the Marine Unit to do a story on our “Swimsafe” efforts. On July 8<sup>th</sup> the City of Bonney Lake declared a “Swimsafe” Proclamation to acknowledge the North Tapps Middle School students for their on-going efforts on drowning prevention. We also participated in the Summer Splash-Tacular events that occurred on July 19 at North Tapps Park and again in August at Allan Yorke Park.



The Marine Unit & East Pierce Fire worked with the Sheriff’s Report to film a segment featuring “Swimsafe” and the North Tapps Middle School Students. The segment began airing

July 1<sup>st</sup> and continued airing during August and September 2014. It also ran on Pierce County TV Ch22. Our Marine Service Officers were interviewed by Pierce County (PCTV) with an emphasis on water safety and cold water incapacitation. We also partnered with Cascade Water Alliance, who purchased “Swimsafe” bracelets for distribution and published the “Swimsafe” water safety tab that ran in local newspapers. Bracelets continue to be handed out during all events. Our Unit also placed a private buoy. We began discussion regarding curriculum development with the Sumner School District to implement peer-to-peer training at the high school level as well as worked with Sumner Bonney Lake Aquatics who created a brochure that features their Teen Basic Swimming program.

The Marine Unit/East Pierce Fire and “Swimsafe” coalition received the “Tom F Warren” Water Safety Award for Outstanding Innovation from the WA State Drowning Prevention Network. “Swimsafe” was asked to present our ‘story’ at two venues; however due to funding the Dallas event could not be attended. “Swimsafe” participated in a live interview with KLAY radio to emphasis fireworks safety and drowning prevention. The Marine Unit presented a booth during Bonney Lake Days and Open House and

The Kawasaki Mule patrolled the forested areas with-in the City of Bonney Lake. The Reserve Officer Program continues to be an asset to the Bonney Lake Police Department and the Community at large. During 2014 Reserve Officer Nate Alvord worked a total of 38 shifts; volunteering 241 hours from January 1<sup>st</sup> to September 27<sup>th</sup>. Since April of 2012 to September 2014 Officer Alvord volunteered a total of 701.50 hours of his time to the Citizens of Bonne Lake. Officer Alvord participated at Community Events such as: Bonney Lake Days, Scout Night, Citizen's Academy, Family Fun Fest and Open House. Officer Alvord also remained active assisting career officers with the Marine Service Unit. At the completion of 2013 Officer Alvord set a goal of becoming a solo Reserve Officer and in February of 2014 Officer Alvord achieved his goal. 

# Crime and Statistics

Sergeant R. Sasaki

The National Incident Based Reporting System (NIBRS) is an incident-based reporting system for crimes known to the police. For each crime incident coming to the attention of law enforcement, a variety of data are collected about the incident. This data includes the nature and types of specific offenses in the incident, characteristics of the victim (s) and offender (s), types and value of property stolen and recovered, and characteristics of persons arrested in connection with a crime incident.

The total number of NIBRS offenses reported to Bonney Lake Police Department in 2014 totaled 1,099. This is slightly up from the 2013 total of 1,075 resulting in a 2.2% increase.

While overall NIBRS offenses were only slightly up in 2014, a substantial increase was seen for Forcible Sex Offenses (80%), Simple Assault (67.1%), Burglary (30.8%), Counterfeiting/ Forgery (47.8%), and Stolen Property Offenses (36.8%). A notable increase was also seen in the reporting of No Contact Order Violations (130.8%) and Domestic Violence Offenses (26.8%).

## Child Passenger Safety Project Manager Cesi Velez

Correct use of child restraints offers the best protection for vehicle child occupants. In 2012, among children under the age of 5 in cars, an estimated 284 lives were saved by child restraints. An additional 58 children could have lived if car seat use was 100 percent. Car seats reduce the risk of fatal injury by 71 percent for infants and by 54 percent for toddlers in cars. In summary, Washington's Child Restraint Law RCW 46.61.687 requires all children to ride in an appropriate car or booster seat until at least age 8 or 4'9" tall; booster seats until adult seat belt fits properly; and up to age 13, children must ride in the back seat.

The goals of Washington's Child Passenger Safety Program:

- Maintain and support an active network of child restraint inspection stations.
- Maintain a sufficient number of child passenger safety technicians.
- Increase driver awareness and enforcement of Washington's child restraint law.

Child Passenger Safety efforts focus on direct involvement by the Project Manager with the local CPS team leader network. This network of active safety advocates consists of 20 Target Zero Managers, 16 SafeKids Coalitions, and 4 local child passenger safety teams.

During the FFY 2013-2014 the following was offered:

1 Renewal course was offered in Spokane.

10 Child Passenger Safety Technician (CPST) training courses were offered throughout Washington.

67 students attended the courses to obtain car seat technician certification.

The CPST classes were held in the following counties: Benton, King, Thurston, Okanogan, Pierce (3), Kitsap, Spokane, and Snohomish.

With the above trainings, Washington currently has 441 nationally certified car seat technicians; 26 of which are certified instructors and 4 are technician proxy. This shows a slight increase from 2012-2013 with 434. The focus continues to recruit and train dedicated individuals and partner with supportive agencies. It is imperative for each potential technician candidate understand the commitment and continuous learning needed to retain certification. The desire is to seek those who will more likely have a long term commitment to child passenger safety and not allow a lapse in their certification after two years.

Thus far in 2014, Washington had 179 technicians eligible for recertification; of which 100 did complete their recertification (55.9%).

Between October 1, 2013 and September 30, 2014, child passenger safety technicians representing 39 active teams in Washington reached their communities in 1,899 different child passenger safety events. Through their efforts...

A grant process was made available to the local CPS team leaders to help address the uniqueness within their community. The following activities were supported by this grant process:

Law enforcement	\$2,135.00	Seats for transporting in emergency situations; required to include CPS training for officers.

The Project Manager of Washington's Child Passenger Safety program participated in 102 activities; reached 350,644 through various media outlets; distributed 708 pieces of material; and inspected 8 car seats.




